
Now I see reports of a bird flu killing over a million chickens and turkeys across the country. So I expect to see the price of poultry products to rise accordingly.

#### **Garden Gadgets**

Here's an interesting device for the square-foot gardener, a 'Seeding Square.' It's a heavy-duty plastic template configured for planting various kinds of vegetable seeds in dense square configurations. It's ideal for the apartment or small lot gardener who wants to save money in the current economic and supply chain crunch.

It comes with the template, a color-coded legend of what sort of plant goes in each of the color-coded holes for maximum productivity in a limited space, and assorted tools to aid in planting seeds at their proper depth.

There are even a series of videos to help the newbee with this sort of gardening.

#### Cabbage Soup Recipe

The ubiquitous, humble, and yet noble, cabbage. You see it in every grocery store. You pass it by because it is so bland. But it is chock full of important vitamins. AND it is inexpensive. So inexpensive that most of us don't bother raising it in our vegetable gardens. Maybe that is about to change, what with the world in turmoil.

So, here's an easy, healthy and delicious recipe that even non-vegans will enjoy. I stumbled upon it at one of the web-sites I frequent and it looked so delicious I gave it a try. And it IS delicious and surprisingly flavorful.

#### **Ingredients**:

- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1/2 yellow onion, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 8 cups low sodium chicken broth, or vegetable broth is fine, too
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/2 teaspoon dried thyme
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper or to taste
- 1/2 head cabbage chopped in 1 1/2" chunks
- 4 carrots, peeled and chopped
- 2 stalks celery, sliced thinly
- 14.5 ounces stewed tomatoes, including liquid

#### **Directions**:

1 - Saute the onions and garlic in the olive oil until the onions are transparent.

- 2 Add all the remaining ingredients.
- 3 Simmer until all the vegetables are tender.

If you want more starch, add some cut-up potatoes, at step 2.

If you wish to add meat to this soup, be sure to cook it separately before adding it.

Serve with good bread and cheese. I prefer good French bagettes and garlic-herb cheese spread. Boursin works, but it's expensive, so I make my own with cream cheese, fines herb, garlic and salt.

\* Collect dues in April and May. Make reminder phone calls and/or send emails to members who have not paid.

\* Update any member information that may have changed over the year. This is easiest to do in a simple Xcel spreadsheet. If anyone needs help with this, contact me and I will be happy to send you a copy you can use. Also let me know if anyone will not be returning. When your club has all the information and dues collected, the treasurer should send the following items to the CFGC assistant treasurer:

1) a check made out to CFGC or Colorado Federation of Garden Clubs for the correct amount (this will need to be mailed)

2) a current membership list, as of June 1. If you can, please highlight any new members and any changed information for continuing members. This can be emailed.

3) a list of officers for the coming year with their contact information. This is very important for state and national officers to be able to contact the individual clubs.

\* If you have new members join after you have sent in your club information or you elect new officers, please send that information to the assistant treasurer.

# Exciting News and Times. November 10 and 11, 2021 we had the very first NGC-sponsored Gardening School. The purpose of this school was to enable students and consultants to be able to take a Gardening School Course at an affordable cost due to some states not having the funding or manpower to accomplish this task. The school was administered via Zoom, and it was very successful. We had participants from coast to coast who enjoyed being part of a learning organization. There were seventy-two participants who attended, of whom sixty-two were new first-time students.

Gardening School Course 2 is scheduled for April 5 and 6, 2022 via Zoom. You can register on the NGC Website and pay online. Course 2 will consist of Plant Diseases and Garden Pests, Irrigation and Water, Lawn Alternatives and Growing Grass, Growing Fruit, and Growing Vegetables. We have an excellent group of presenters who are experts in their field on the subject matter.

It will soon be spring, and when this course is completed, it will be spring, the time will have changed, and the days will be longer. You can go play outside and put this gardening knowledge to work. Whether it's your flower garden or vegetable garden, you can get your hands in the soil and that is proven to be good for our mental health. With everything happening in our world today, with supply and demand of everything, store shelves empty, what if we grew some of our own fruit and vegetables? #### 2021-2022 Annual Report

Focusing on Membership beginning in July 2021, Lyn and Bruce Carlisle held an informal garden party and tour at their home for supporters of our annual Plant and Bake Sale to encourage them to join our club. Lyn's efforts, as GMGC Membership Chair, have resulted in the doubling of our membership from 10 to 20 in 6 months.

In addition to our presence on Facebook and Instagram, GMGC purchased a domain name and website. Alex Rodriguez, GMGC Vice President, designed the site and updates it regularly. This has made a difference in communicating with people interested in joining the club and people who want to volunteer to work with us on our community projects.

Our 2021-2022 community projects include:

Guadalupe Community Center.

Prep and plant the four raised vegetable beds.

The produce raised is used to feed the residents of the shelter.

Linn Grove Cemetery, prep, plant and maintain: Memorial Star at Soldiers Field at Linn Grove Cemetery (red, white and blue annuals).Four new gardens at the newly constructed ossuary Circle perennial bed

In spring, placed red, white and blue floral baskets at our newly dedicated Blue and Gold Star Memorial Markers; replaced with chrysanthemum baskets in autumn. Plant four urns and one small garden in trade for stones placed at our community projects stating the site is planted and maintained by Greeley Morning Garden Club along with a smaller size for our members to place in their personal gardens stating their membership in the club.

Update the plantings and maintain the Centennial Park Garden Library.

Plant and maintain three memorial urns at Veterans Memorial in Bittersweet Park.

Donate four trees at the newly redeveloped site at the former Greeley Fire Station No. 2 using the NFRD

Maintain the Pearl Usher Memorial Garden at Madison Elementary School.

#### Other projects:

Annually members and residents of Bonell Retirement Center create floral room décor using dried flowers from members' gardens. As we were unable to go to the site, at our November meeting members created and delivered 70 lovely arrangements for the residents. Unfortunately, Bonell's is closing so we will be seeking another project to replace this one in 2022-2023.

GMGC was asked to continue the Greeley Garden Tour (a self-guided tour of five gardens throughout Greeley) beginning in June 2022. We agreed and are in the planning phase of the tour. We are offering discounted tickets to CFGC members.

Planning is underway for our 62nd annual Plant and Bake Sale. We are returning to our full-scale operation including online purchases through our website, along with all of the usual plants, bake sale, gift baskets, and discounted gift cards, which will be available on site, Saturday, May 7, 2022.

March 8, 2022 via ZOOM/In Person at Emerson House Start at 11:15

All Past Presidents, Officers, Historian, Parliamentarian, All Committee Chairmen, All District, Presidents, All Headquarter Trustees, All Club Presidents', All NGC Officers Chairmen/Committee Members, Regional Officer/Chairmen/Committee Members (14 quorum)

#### Special Guests: None.

The meeting was called to order at:11:45 am by Nancy Griffin, President. She welcomed every one. There were 11 present and 6 via Zoom.

The minutes of the December. 8, 2021 meeting were approved as modified with a motion by Chuck Pelto.

Financial Report: Margie Soileau reviewed and highlighted items of interest. She clarified how the Awards line item works. Chuck Pelto moved that the report be filed as presented. There was a second and the motion passed.

Michele Gustin announced that she needs awards applications and yearbooks, etc., for Awards to be presented at the Annual Convention. She needs them by the end of the month.

#### **New Business**

The CFGC 2022 Annual Convention will be June 5 at the Botanic Gardens. The registration fee will \$45. Benefits of attending are entrance to the Gardens and Art Exhibits, lunch and a wine and cheese reception and program by Annie Barrow of the Horticulture Outreach Program. The time on the announcement may change. Club presidents are encouraged to pass the information on to their members.

The 2024 NGC Annual meeting in Colorado: Nancy announced that Colorado has been selected as the host state for the NGC convention in 2024. A committee has been formed to work with NGC, consisting of Victoria Schmidt, Margie Soileau, and Audrey Coyle.

Plant America month is April 2022 (read on CGFC blog) Audrey Coyle is the state and the national chair for this. A flyer was sent to club presidents.

NGC Zoom Gardening School, Series 1, Course 2, will be held April 5-6 (under education tab on CFGC website) This is an Outreach program to all members. Students need to register for it by the end of March. Nancy talked about upcoming schools and where information could be found.

Nancy read an Arbor Day announcement. Report club tree plantings to Nancy to pass on to Audrey Coyle by May. Arbor Day in Colorado is April 29.

The 2022 Northern Front Range District meeting will be April 2 at Emerson House, hosted by Floral Arts. Business meeting starts at 9:30 and Zoom attendance will be available. Speaker will discuss youth gardening. She clarified budgeting for the Northern Front Range District. There will be a \$25 registration fee, which includes lunch for those attending in person.

The 2022 Southern District meeting will be held April 23, hosted by Cheyenne Mountain, from 9-3 pm at the Historic Congregational Church in Manitou Springs. The registration fee of \$30 covers light breakfast, lunch and snack. A speaker will cover what's new in 2022 from Welby Gardens.

Emerson House Report. Debbie Martin, Chair of the Emerson House Trustees, announced meeting dates along with giving a report. She thanked folks for coming to Emerson to help with maintenance and clean up. An urgent need is that three more trustees are needed.
