Garden Gadgets

The Dead of Winter

My Dear Fellow Gardeners,

So here we are. And a Happy New Year. Winter first. All January, February and maybe even into March, depending on the 'Climate Change.'

Not really the best gardening weather. But good for planning, acquiring necessary materials and preparing for the coming growing season. Which is closer than it appears on your calendar.

In the meantime, one can do gardening in a sunroom. Or even in a southern exposure window, which is what we're doing with the wine bottle gardening described in the last issue of the Colorado Garden Connection. It's coming along. But getting it started has proven to be a challenge.

We started with one wine bottle with watercress. It's been a learning experience. With the first effort, the wicking alone didn't bring enough water and nutrient for the seeds to sprout. Or rather, the lack of humidity dries up the water in the sponge-like medium. To overcome this deficiency we started adding water and nutrient to the seeds from above. A daily eye-dropper full. The seeds sprouted, but due to the dry nature of our semi-arid climate, they collapsed. So we put some clear plastic wrap over the top of the opening, turning the bottle into a terrarium.

The seeds still sprouted, but died. I'm thinking the nutrient was too concentrated for the sprouts. So we've reduced the Miracle Gro and epsom salt by half. The seeds are sprouting. We'll see what develops.

In the meantime, Pueblo is getting more than its usual amount of precipitation this Winter. A good sign for this growing season, as long as it keeps up.

Years ago, we received twice as much precipitation as usual. At the club garden project, the columbines, which usually grew to knee-high, were waist-high that season. It was so dense we were wading through it to tend the garden.

Apricot-Nut Cheese Roll

Well the Holiday Tea Party at Nancy's was delightful. And someone asked for the recipe for the cheese log we provided for the feast. Albeit few of us grow apricot or hazelnut, they're both things we could grow, so they qualify for Culinary Corner.

However, I will comment benefit of apricot trees. When we lived in Englewood, a house on the far corner of our block had five or six such trees– full grown–in their back yard, trimmed at their bottom branches to seven feet above the ground. It was

in the back yard. The grass was dense and richly green. Walking past it on a hot Summer afternoon, all the moisture exuded from the leaves, it was like walking past a giant evaporative cooler. So refreshing.

Ingredients:

- 8 ozs Cream Cheese, softened
- 1/4 cup semi-dried Apricots, coarsely chopped
- 1/4 cup Hazelnuts, toasted and chopped
- 1/4 cup White Sesame Seeds, toasted
- Crackers
- Italian parsley [Optional as Garnish]

Instructions:

[1] Toast and coarsely chop the Hazelnuts.

- [2] Toast the Sesame Seeds.
- [3] Chop the Apricots.

[4] Combine Apricots and Hazelnuts with the Cream Cheese.


[5] Form the combined material into a roll. Place the roll on plastic wrap or waxed paper with the sesame seeds.

[6] Roll the cheese log in the sesame seeds.

[7] Serve with the crackers, either in a pot to spread or sliced thin already on the crackers. If the latter, chill the roll before slicing.

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Help Wanted for the 2024 NGC Convention

Do you like to put on social events? Like to plan parties, have fun and get to know more "like minded" people? Then you are the person we are looking for.

We are getting ready to start planning the 2024 National Garden Club Annual Meeting which is happening here in Denver in June of 2024.

We are seeking people to volunteer to be Committee Chairs or to serve on a committee. Please see the following opportunities to be a part of something special.

Registration Committee: help to supply registration packets which will include meal tickets, copy of the registration form and other information. Help is needed to man the registration booth to welcome attendees, vendors, sponsors and others.

Speaker and workshop Leader Committee Chair(s): will be responsible for speaker and workshop leader selection, contracting and onsite management. Goal is to have a speaker representing one of the Mission statement elements. Once speaker and workshop leaders are selected the Chair must work with the NGC President to complete the Speaker contract for each speaker/ workshop leader. Key components of the contract are the following: Day/date/time of the presentation, topic, fee, additional possible compensation, hotel room if needed, one meal, travel and materials (for workshops only). Also included in the duties is to make sure that our guests do not run into any problems while on site.

Designer Committee Chair: Responsible for the selection, contracting and on site management of a Designer for the Event. The Guest Designer Committee should be constructed by the Committee Chair with persons having a wide array of experience in floral design or who attend design presentations.

Exhibits Committee Chair: This chair must work with the NGC Committee chairs whose work may be exhibited to stake out a location for each of these functions. Any sponsors must have a prime location close to the major events attended by all attendees. Each sponsor is provided with a table and room for any marketing collateral they choose to bring. Exhibits are best located near the vendors so that they have good foot traffic. The floor space, tables and tripods vary greatlyso planning ahead is recommended. Vendor Committee Chair: Responsible for vendor selection, contracting, onsite management. The goal is to have products appealing to each of the 4 disciplines represented in NGC: gardening, landscaping, floral design and the environment.

Page/Hostess Committee Chair: Need 2 hostesses stationed at each doorway to the banquet hall collecting meal tickets. Pages should be assigned to assist the convention chair, the NGC President and the President Elect.

Signage Committee Chair: This chair works with their committee to create attractive signs that might be needed such as Registration table, credentials, directional signage, etc. These signs should be appropriate to the hotel decor and the theme of the meeting.

Table Designs Chair: Table designs should be appropriate and correspond with the convention theme, the speaker's topic at the meal. The designs shouldn't be so tall that they obstruct those seated at the table's vision of each other and the speaker.Typically these designs are given away after the meals so they should not be so large that they can't be carried by someone that is flying.

Food Committee Chair: Works with the NGC President and/or President Elect to come up with menus.

Give Aways: If wanted/needed this person will arrange for give aways and goodies. Also responsible for pamphlets on a table near the registration.

Honor Designs Committee Chair: This chair procures designers to create a design for the NGC President, the NGC President Elect and the host state President. This chair works with the signage committee chairs so that small tent card signs can be created stating who the design honors and the designers name.

Music: If music is to be used during the meals or reception, this chair is to have the NGC Presidents approval, provide and have the appropriate contract signed with the musician(s).

Photography: This chair may serve as the official photographer. Once the photos are taken and after the convention, the photos need to be loaded onto the web and sent to the NAtional Gardener Article.

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Humor Down on the Farm

Publicity: provides publicity to advertise the meeting. Can work with NGC MEdia committee

Refresher/symposium Chair: This is optional and must have the NGC President's approval. This is to be a preor post- convention event although some banquets may apply to the hours needed.
