Benefits of being part of CFGC and NGC

- 1. **Non-Profit Organization**: CFGC Clubs are part of a Colorado Secretary of State (CO SOS) registered non-profit organization by belonging to the CFGC. This allows:
 - Tax Exemption Clubs, Districts, & CFGC are Tax Exempt. Items purchased for Club, District, or CFGC projects/business are not charged tax. Clubs can use the CFGC tax exempt certificate to get an exemption. Club Presidents should have a copy.
 - **Donations are Tax deductible**: Donations (Monetary and Products) to clubs, districts, and CFGC are tax deductible to the donor when allowed by the State and/or the IRS because CFGC is a registered Non-Profit organization and a 501c organization.
 - Silent Auctions without a Raffle License CFGC, Districts and CFGC Clubs can hold silent auctions without having to register and buy a raffle license from the State. The CO Secretary of State (SOS) allows registered non-profit organizations (CFGC) to hold silent auctions without a raffle license because they consider it to be a donation to the non-profit organization. This is documented on the CO SOS website.
 - National Level Organization: Being part of the CFGC and NGC allows your club to be associate with organizations that are well known, are registered non-profit organizations and 501© organizations, which allows donors and sponsors to feel comfortable they are dealing with a group backed by reputable, well-known organizations and they will be more willing helping your club with community projects, fundraising and events.

2. Education

• Educational Speakers:

- Speaker List: CFGC gathers, collates, and maintains a list of speakers at the State (CFGC) level and distribute it to the Districts and Club Presidents so their clubs can obtain quality speakers for meetings and conferences. Submit your favorite speakers to add to the list!
- Money for Speakers: CFGC has started a new program to allow districts and clubs to apply for a grant (Up to \$300/year/club, \$500 for District) to help pay for educational speakers at your meetings or events. This program is managed by a committee has instructions and application form available to the Club Presidents.

• Educational Classes:

Access to NGC Classes (online and in person) which can get taken as part of a certification program or just as
informational. These schools are highly informative and typically have several different highly respected
speakers. They are reasonably priced and provide great value.

• Certifications:

Classes and Certifications for Gardening, Landscape Design, Environmental Studies, and Flower Design.
 Classes are provided both in person and online in most cases.

Conferences:

- Attend District, State, Regional and National Conferences to hear great speakers, participate in fun educational workshops, meet other garden enthusiasts, and continue your gardening &/or design education.
- Participate in the Colorado Garden and Home Show with CFGC. You can recruit new members for your club
 if desired. Hosts during the show (usually 2-3 hrs) also get into the show for free all day plus a free parking
 pass. Colorado Garden and Home show is put on by the non-profit Colorado Garden Foundation.

3. CFGC Headquarters:

• FREE use of Emerson House with pre-booking. The HQ building is in downtown Denver. It has large and medium sized meeting spaces, a small kitchen, a waiting area, and a front and rear garden area. It has Wi-Fi and a color laser copier/printer. It can be booked for meetings, a club day out, a celebration, and many other opportunities.

- Canva PRO licenses: CFGC has procured 50 licenses to be used at the State, District, and Club levels. Each CFGC Officer, Chair, and Club will have the option to receive a PRO level license (some clubs may receive 2 licenses depending on club size & needs) for FREE. CFGC worked to get these licenses to provide additional value to our members so that you do not need to purchase these yourselves. The Tech committee will be setting up the accounts over the next several months. We have had classes on using Canva and will do more in the near future.
- Zoom: CFGC has a zoom account for virtual meetings currently. CFGC Officers, Chairs, Districts and Clubs can request to have a meeting scheduled using the CFGC Zoom account. The requests will be reviewed and approved on a 1st come, 1st serve basis, not to interfere with standing meetings scheduled by CFGC and provided that a CFGC Officer or Tech Committee member is available to start the meeting for you (someone will most likely be available). This is FREE to you. We can also help coordinate if clubs want to purchase their own Zoom accounts through CFGC's TechSoup (50% discount) or wish to share one with another club.
- **Color Laser Printing/Copying**: CFGC has a color laser printer/copier and a back-up color inkjet printer at Emerson House. Clubs may use the printer/copier at Emerson House **FREE** of charge.
- Wi-Fi: CFGC has Wi-Fi at Emerson House which is FREE of charge for members to use while at Emerson House.
- **Google Suite**: CFGC has approved purchasing Google Suite/Drive for storage. This allows us to store documents securely in the cloud and make them available to our members. It also allows multiple people to collaborate at once on a document and see what each other is doing. We have classes on Google Workspace apps.
- **YouTube:** CFGC has a YouTube Channel. We are slowly adding videos and hope this will be a place we can share videos and podcasts for educational purposes and entertainment for our members.

- **New Clubs:** May be awarded to the district, club(s) and or individual bringing one or more new clubs into the CFGC. The sponsoring party is to notify the Membership Chairman.
- New Club Achievement Award: Awarded to a newly established club after their second year of membership
 in CFGC. A garden club President's pin is to be awarded to the club, to be passed from President to
 President. It is obligation of the Club to notify the Membership Chairman that this award is due.
- Lyn Verretta Heart Warmer Award: This program recognizes outstanding dedication and efforts of garden club members for work directly related to the functions and activities of the club. Each club may designate one person by the March Board meeting. Requirements of the nominee are paid dues to the club for a minimum of three years, outstanding dedication to the club and a person whose actions "warm the hearts" of club members. Use the Heart Warmer Award Application form # 3 and include a short paragraph of the nominee's accomplishments.
